In what was an expected email from Father McShane after an egregious act of racial violence occurred that prompted everyone with a moral compass to say *something* despite the fact that this terrorism is *not new*, I have to admit that I am tired and unimpressed by his response. As a senior at Fordham, I have seen several violent and racist acts occur on our campuses that have not elicited such a response from our president. This commitment to protecting students feels hollow.

Where was our support when the n word was carved into the door of a black student his second week of campus? Where were the intentional conversations that should have been at a minimum *attended* by the administration about anti-Semitism when there were swastikas carved into school property? These events were investigated but called "bias incidents". I have heard stories of students yelling racial slurs on campus at other students but that has seemed to be met with silence.

These emails are not enough for me. As a black student at Fordham University, I feel consistently like I am not wanted on my campus. I feel unprotected and neglected. When a hate crime occurs on our campus or nationally, I need more than an email that expresses heartfelt concern and compassion to the victims. I need *action* and I need a *commitment* from those who follow the motto of being "men and women for others" to actively practice what they preach. I do not feel supported, heard or respected by the President of my University currently, and I hope that before I graduate my feelings will change.
